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bozu. In China, when a village had heavy rain due to continuous rain, a girl called "São Qíng Niáng (掃晴娘=clearing the sky maiden)," praved to the rain god, Lóngs Shén (龍神=Dragon God) to stop. A voice from the heavens responded, "If you become my bride, I'll stop the rain." Săo


Qing Niáng musume accepted this, and the rain stopped, clearing the sky. As São Qíng Niáng ascended to the heavens

and disappeared. People began making dolls resembling a beautiful girl sweeping away rain clouds with a broom to hang in hopes of clear weather. So why did it become "bozu" (坊主= monk) in Japan instead of "musume" (娘=girl)?

Legend has it that in ancient times, a lord troubled by continuous rain asked a famous monk known for always bringing clear weather through chanting sutras to stop the rain.

However, when even the sutras couldn't stop the rain, the angry lord allegedly cut off the monk's head and placed it on the eaves, after which the rain stopped. In the third verse of the children's song "Teru Teru Bozu (Buddhist monks praying for good weather)," there are somewhat ominous lyrics: "*Teru teru bozu*, teru bozu, please make tomorrow's weather nice, if you make it cloudy or rainy, I'll cut off your head." 4 4

It's said that teru teru bozu were used by farmers to pray for rain, with the face pointed downwards when rain was needed and upwards when clear weather was desired. Director, Hosokawa

Although it took a bit of time due to individual color selection and teacher assistance with finishing touches, each participant successfully crafted a unique and stylish keychain.
