Time flies, and the year is almost coming to an end. December is known for "year-end cleaning," but at *Shinto* shrines across Japan, a purification ceremony called "*Oharae*" held every June and December. The December ceremony,

> known as the "Year-End *Ōharae*," is a ritual for people to cleanse their bodies and minds in preparation for the New Year. The practice originates from the myth of *Izanagi*, who purified himself at a sacred spot in what is now *Miyazaki* Prefecture, after escaping the land of the dead. This act of purification,

called "misogi", gave birth to the term we use today. During the Japanese New Year, homes are prepared

to welcome the *Toshigami* (New Year deity) who brings blessings. Here are a few key traditions: *Kadomatsu* (pine decoration): Placed at the entrance, it serves as a Kadomatsu guidepost for the *Toshigami*. Pine, a symbol of longevity and

vitality, is considered sacred alongside bamboo. Kagami Mochi: A stack of two round rice cakes, symbolizing the sun and moon, represents hopes for a bountiful harvest and family prosperity. The orange on top, called

"daidai", symbolizes family continuity across generations. In Japanese, the words for "orange" (daidai) and "for generations" (daidai) are pronounced the same.

*Shimenawa* (sacred rope): Hung at entrances to indicate a purified space where the deity will enter. *Osechi Ryori*: Special

New Year's dishes prepared as offerings to the *Toshigami*, God of the Year, later shared by the family to receive the deity's blessings. Each dish has its own meaning, often related to health and prosperity. It's believed that the *Toshigami* stays in homes until around January 7, and during this time, families are

Shimenawa encouraged to show respect and give thanks to the deity, putting aside the hustle of daily life. At *Hiro* Community Development Center, we remain committed to providing a welcoming, safe, and engaging space for evervone in the *Hiro* community. As we move



### Editorial Note Story of "Toshikoshi Soba"

One of Japan's traditional customs is eating "Toshikoshi Soba" (year-crossing *soba*) on New Year's Eve. This practice is believed to have spread during the *Edo* period, with a few interesting theories about its origins: The most common belief is that it symbolizes the wish for a long life, as soba noodles are thin and long. Another theory stems from soba's tendency to break easily, representing the desire to cut away the misfortunes of the past year and start the new one with a fresh mindset. A third explanation relates to the goldsmiths of the Edo period, who used soba flour to collect gold dust, leading to the belief that soba can bring financial fortune. Each of these ideas is compelling. As we enjoy Toshikoshi Sobathis year, let's reflect on these rich traditions and meanings. Moreover, it's worth noting that soba flour, the main ingredient in these noodles, is highly nutritious, something people from the past must have appreciated. Enjoy your *Toshikoshi Soba* with these thoughts in mind this New Year's Eve!
